The Empower Project is an intersectional feminist, membership organisation supporting communities to end violence against women and girls. We became a charity in February 2017 and this report tells the story of our first year.

Our vision, the ultimate goal of The Empower Project, is of communities ending violence against women and girls. We see our role in that vision as supporting communities through training, networking, influencing policy and making available resources to lead change to end violence against women and girls. We continuously strive to be proactive, bold and accessible.

Over the past year, our work has focused on sex, relationships and abuse in the digital age, and the impact specifically on young people. We have worked to support young people to directly influence policy and practice around digital abuse. We are the only organisation in Scotland with a specific focus on participation, young people and digital forms of violence against women and girls.



During 2017-18, we have been busy recruiting members and volunteers, hosting feminist events, delivering training to organisations across Scotland, and bringing in funding so we can carry out our work. As I write this, we have a new group of passionate, enthusiastic and dedicated trustees, volunteers and two co-directors all working towards to achieving our vision.

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
